

Registrants are encouraged to bring slides to assist with questions during open exchange portions of the program. A videotape room will be open on Saturday, 11 a.m.-5 p.m., with instructional tapes available for viewing.

MINI-SYMPOSIA

Premiering in this year's scientific program are two, three-hour minisymposia scheduled for Friday afternoon, 3-6 p.m.

Mackinnon, MD, of Toronto. It will cover recent advances in the basic and clinical sciences that can significantly improve surgical results and functional recovery. Discussions of clinical advances will:

- Describe nuances in techniques that have afforded important advances in surgical results.
- Identify possibilities for improvement in functional recovery.

Discussion of basic science advances

- Describe advances in the understanding of neuroregulation, repair and regen-
- Evaluate the potential for using advanced understanding of neuroregulation to improve functional recovery after peripheral nerve surgery.
- Illustrate how advances in comprehension of neuroregulation can lead to better understanding of treatment failure.

Presented by Robert D. Acland, MD, the *Blood Vessel* symposium will be a structured, but highly informal, no-platform discussion open to members and guests. It will cover the entire spectrum of small-vessel surgery from lab studies to clinical applications. Featured topics will include:

- New anastomotic devices;
- Progress in thrombosis research;
- New and improved flaps;
- Progress in prefabricated flaps;
- Salvage techniques and more.

Participants should come prepared to contribute their own knowledge and share latest findings, thoughts, opinions and slides.



Technology editor selected to deliver Founders Lecture

Andy Lightbody, aerospace and high technology editor for CBS Radio, will deliver the Founders Lecture at this year's Annual Meeting in Toronto. His topics include the \$1.5 billion Hubble space telescope and technology in the 90s.

After a rather jinxed launch and a shaky start, Lightbody says the Hubble telescope is on its way to becoming the premier telescope of all time. Capable of imaging distant objects with great clarity and

definition, Hubble is sure to rewrite many of the books on theories of the universe, he says.

Heard by nearly 68 million people each week on national CBS Radio, Lightbody describes himself as a long-time "Hubble-ite." He was present at CapeCanaveral when the shuttle lifted off with the telescope, and he greeted it on its return to Edwards Airforce Base.

Lightbody's presentation will include a slide show of rare photos that illustrate how the telescope was made, launched and put in space. He will also show some of the first images Hubble returned to earth, as well as artists' conceptions of what scientists hope to find.

In addition to the "nuts-and-bolts" of the world's most expensive telescope, Lightbody will share personal anecdotes and comments from the people who built the craft, and who "continue to bite their fingernails in anticipation of making the sophisticated telescope an operational reality."

Recipient of the 1989 Golden Mike Award, Lightbody has written and reported regularly on the military, commercial and general aviation, aerospace, defense contractors and geo-politics. Meeting participants are encouraged to attend with spouses and guests.
