Scientific program highlights

Founders Lecture

Dr. Edgar Biemer, professor of surgery at the University of Munich, will deliver the Founders Lecture titled "Reconstruction of the Extremities by Free Tissue Transfer — Seventeen-Year Personal Experience."

Professor Biemer studied medicine and trained in plastic surgery at universities in Frankfurt, Vienna and London. He established the first replantation center in Germany in 1975 and has published many articles on microsurgery. Professor Biemer is president of the International Society of Reconstructive Microsurgery and is a founder and the first secretary of the Germany Speaking Group for Microsurgery of Peripheral Nerves and Vessels.

Bone Symposium

"State-of-the-art" presentations on the physiology of osteogenesis, bone morphogenic protein, conventional bone grafting, free bone transfer, osteocutaneous transfer, allografts and the Ilizarov technique will be included in the symposium.



ASRM to co-sponsor international meeting

Combined meeting of the American, French, Italian and Spanish Microsurgical Societies

The American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery has accepted an invitation from the Groupe Pour L'Avancement De La Microchirurgie to participate in a combined meeting in Saint Tropez, France, from May 21-23, 1993. Located on the coast of France, this resort is very

easy to reach from Paris or London. A further attraction of this combined meeting is that it will precede the First European Congress of Hand Surgery in Brussels, to be held May 26-29, 1993.

ASRM has agreed to take part in the meeting by presenting free papers and by participating in clinical panels, the themes of which include head and neck, thumb reconstruction, skin coverage of upper extremities, lymphatics, leg reconstruction, replanation, oesophageal reconstruction and brachial plexus.

Michael B. Wood, MD, ASRM past president, will serve as program chairman for this meeting.

Combined Tissue Transfer Symposium a success

Attendees gave high marks to the Current Concepts in Microsurgical Tissue Transfer Symposium held March 18-22 in St. Louis, MO. The program was cosponsored by ASRM and the Plastic Surgery Educational Foundation (PSEF) and chaired by Robert C. Russell, MD and Roger K. Khouri, MD.

The meeting facilities, exhibitors and scientific program were all exceptional. A total of 21 national and international

faculty members spoke on the anatomy of the most commonly used flaps, technical innovations, "how to" tips for practicing microsurgeons, and free tissue transfers by anatomic area. Free paper presentations by attendees were offered at the end of each day. Evening videotape sessions included tapes provided by the PSEF, and a cadaver dissection session was sponsored by Washington University School of Medicine. The evaluations demonstrate the program's excellence — 85% of the attendees rated the program goodexcellent.

The meeting also provided a forum to view commercial exhibits by 14 companies. Finally, we are very grateful to our sponsors for the significant corporate support provided for this important program.
