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

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Focusing on the Next Set of Goals

SRM is alive and well. I want to thank Allen Bishop for a phenomenal "job well done" and an exciting and vibrant meeting in the Bahamas. I believe it was one of our best meetings ever for attendance and the scientific program was amazing. We hope to at least match the scientific material in Scottsdale in January of 2016. Certainly we will match the sun but no sandy beaches in Arizona.

Several years ago under the direction of Joseph Serletti, ASRM underwent a strategic planning process. This year we will again take a critical look at what ASRM has been doing, our progress on the strategic initiatives and how we might have to adapt based on the every changing landscape. Some of these ideas and initiatives I have listed below. Some may require bylaw changes so please feel free to give feedback and comments.

1. Under the direction of Allen Bishop, we took a hard look at membership and how we could attract additional members. We placed advertisements in society journals, looked at international members and attempted to attract all microsurgeons regardless of specialty. This year, we continue these efforts and are in the process of making our application for membership simpler. We are attempting to contact people who submitted abstracts to the meeting but currently were not members. We continue to focus on European and Asian members and will target international program directors.

- 2. We created a task force to look at the mechanisms for a visiting professor program. As most of you may know, a variety of societies have a visiting professor program and I believe that the talent and depth of the field is so great, ASRM should also offer a visiting professor opportunity.
- 3. We will submit to change the Exhibit Committee to include the ASRM President, President-Elect, Past President and Program Chair.
- 4. We will submit to combine the Endowment Committee and the Development Committee—this will allow a more focused direction for fund raising. Larry Colen and David Song will continue to lead this committee and plan a campaign for future development. You should receive a letter soon.

- 5. We have asked the chair of the CPT Committee for ASRM to sit on the CPT RUC Committee for ASPS. This is a real mechanism for our voice to be heard and allows more advocacy in great numbers for reconstructive surgery.
- 6. We will submit to move the Clinical Guidelines Committee to come under the direction of the Education Committee. This will also allow a greater focus on outcomes and educating not only our physicians but the public as well.
- 7. We will continue to work with the Education Committee to see how we can capture our materials on PSEN. This year, several panels and instructional courses were video taped. The ability to capture and share our talents and techniques with the side benefit of helping the financial bottom line of ASRM, continues to be a major focus of this committee.
- 8. We continue our safety campaigns, including our dog bite initiative. We are also looking at other opportunities including collaborating with some of the lymphedema societies.
- We are looking to do a silent auction for the January 2016 meeting. Anyone with items that they might like to contribute, please let us know.
- 10. Finally we are looking at the way our governance is set up. Ray Dunn is currently heading a task force that will look at possible better overall strategic governance directions that can lead the society in the years to come with the ever changing health care market.

FROM THE EDITOR

Learning Beyond Today

There are many wonderful things about being a reconstructive surgeon, but perhaps one of these most important is the opportunity for lifelong learning. Whether you have just begun your training, in your early years as an attending, or are in the twilight of your career, there is always a need to learn. Our patients present with unique problems, our peers request advice, and our trainees demand to know the latest and most innovative methods to solve a particular problem.

Opportunities to learn are boundless ranging from formal didactic education to learning from our mistakes in clinical practice. During my residency I learned about pedicled and free TRAM breast reconstruction. During fellowship this was refined to muscle sparing free TRAM flaps. My first exposure to perforator flap breast reconstruction was at the ASRM meeting nearly 20 years ago. The concept that a single perforator could adequately perfuse a free flap breast reconstruction seemed outrageous, yet it was being done with great success. Today, microsurgeons are performing extremity and face transplantation.

This past year I was fortunate to be invited as one of the Plastic Surgery Foundations Visiting Professors. This was not only an opportunity to share knowledge and ideas, but it was an opportunity to learn. At every location, I learned how things were done similarly and differently at other institutions. My last trip was to New Orleans where I was hosted by the faculty, residents and students from the Louisiana State University and Tulane programs. The highlight of the experience was an afternoon in their state of the art anatomy lab. After a morning lecture on mandible reconstruction, I taught residents and fellows how to harvest a fibula free flap and then design and conduct accurate fibula osteotomies for mandible reconstruction without the use of CAD/CAM technology. In return they taught me how to do a PAP flap. The students teaching the teacher-it does not get better than that!

Our patients' needs coupled with constantly evolving technology demands that we refine old techniques, learn new skills, and perhaps most importantly, think outside the box. The ASRM is full of incredibly talented individuals from all over the world. The leadership of our society has created a meeting that fosters global participation in a destination environment. Whether you learn in a scientific session, an instructional course, the exhibit hall, or at a social gathering, the opportunities to learn are limitless. Sometimes it's as simple as a conversation on a golf course. RM

plinary solutions with microsurgical and non-microsurgical options. We had placed special emphasis on introducing expert speakers and panelists from outside the US as well, which resulted in the highest number of European participants this time as the second largest group next to the well established and productive members from Asia. The discussions in and after the breakout panels were lively and very fruitful, especially with this international set of surgeons of all microsurgical disciplines. Even less frequently covered topics, such as gender reassignment surgery and humanitarian microsurgery, were really well attended. The sessions covering the newest updates in lymphatic surgery also attracted a great deal of interest.

ASRM President Allen T. Bishop, MD most directly enriched his meeting's motto with his touching presidential lecture/concert combination. In addition to the wealth of expertise shared in the scientific sessions, the annual meeting was again a great opportunity to network and connect to a large number of colleagues and friends, particularly at the various nonformal program events. Despite the rainstorm, which interrupted the ASRM Celebration event, spirits remained high and the location provided ample opportunities to celebrate, discuss and plan future cooperations and research projects.

This year's annual meeting introduced the Old Turks/Young Turks Smack Down event, which was won by the group of young microsurgeons this time. A new travel award was donated by the Program Chair and will continue to be given each year to the winning group in this competition.





he "Future Growth" committee of the ASRM met with Dr. Evans during our annual meeting in the Bahamas. Our goal for the coming year is to obtain a more significant commitment of funding from our membership. Currently, a suggested donation amount of \$200 is listed on the annual dues notice. The committee felt that asking for a 5-10 year commitment of \$2,500 might be an excellent way to increase our funding without it being too onerous for our membership. This extended commitment would guarantee an ongoing commitment of \$250 or more per year from each donor.

The current commitment from our Past Presidents of \$5,000 over 5 years will continue to be sought. The ASRM currently has \$91,000 in the Future Growth Fund. The ASRM expenses related to grants and scholarships per year is currently \$18,700. The goal is to bring the fund up to approximately \$350,000 so that only 5% of the fund is used on an annual basis to mirror the typical stipulations of an actual endowment fund. It is imperative that both the ASRM Council and the "Future

the use of the funds by highlighting the grants that have been. It would make sense for those that receive grants to provide us with a short synopsis of their work which would be added to the newsletter. Overall, the ASRM needs to be a bit more aggressive with soliciting donations, as long as the requests are "reasonable."
