#### HISTORIAN'S CORNER

## Innovations and Controversy Often Went Hand in Hand

n this year of turbulence related to the pandemic, forcing innovation in the way we practice medicine and promote the societal good over our individual needs, the passing of two men in 2021, one a surgeon-colleague and one a patient, has brought me to reflect on the connections we form in plastic surgery, the innovation in our speciality, and the ethical checks and balances in adapting new treatments.

The surgeon: Professor Jean-Michel Dubernard passed away on July 11, 2021 in Lyons, France at the age of 80. He rose to the forefront as a pioneer in transplantation<sup>1</sup> with his landmark hand transplant in 1998, bilateral hand transplant in 2000, and participation in the first partial face transplant in 2005. Although shrouded in controversy related to patient compliance and motivation, we had to stand up and take notice of his ambition to advance medicine, and the feasibility of the technical, functional, and artistic feat that could be accomplished. It also made surgeons, in particular members of the ASRM, use this as an opportunity to explore the ethical issues and transplantation immunology and longterm survival strategies related to face and limb transplantation.

**The man:** Clint Hallam passed away in the city of Lyons, France on September 4, 2021, at the age of 69. He was the recipient of Professor Dubernard's first hand transplant in 1998. He misrepresented the situation surrounding his

injury, stating that he lost his hand in a domestic accident, but it was later revealed that it was severed when he fell on an electric saw while in prison in his native New Zealand. While the operation was a surgical success, he was unable to adapt to his new hand and was noncompliant with his immunosuppressive medications, so that he rejected it and the transplanted hand was surgically removed 27 months later.<sup>1</sup>

It is not the first time, however, that the journey towards successful transplantation had a controversial start. The first heart transplant was carried out on December 3, 1967 by South African cardiac surgeon Christiaan Barnard in Cape Town.<sup>2</sup> This first ever human-to-human heart transplant was cavalier surgery in which Dr. Barnard had not informed the administration that the procedure would take place, members of the surgical team had not gone through a trial run, and in fact they waited for the donor heart to completely stop beating before procurement to avoid medicolegal issues. It was a surgical success, where the recipient, Louis Washkansky, initially had an excellent recovery, but then felt less well and developed lung infiltrates that were interpreted as a response to rejection of the transplanted organ and the immunosuppressive therapy was increased. Unfortunately, the diagnosis was actually pneumonia and the patient succumbed 18 days later despite adding antibiotic therapy. Ironically, the transplanted heart was the last organ to fail in this surgery that had been performed with technical prowess. However, his second transplant patient, Philip Blaiberg, lived for 1.5 years following his procedure in 1968, and Dr. Barnard's

5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> patients lived for almost 13 and 24 years, respectively, paving the way for modern day heart transplantation programs, techniques, and outcomes.

Similarly, the meeting of two men in 1998 who both passed in 2021 opened the door to the era of hand and face transplantation, and has allowed the leaders in our specialty to achieve further advances to make these surgeries viable options for rigorouslyselected patients within multidisciplinary support programs. RM

## The Future of Microsurgery Is Strong



or two cycles now, microsurgery fellowship applicants have had to face the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic. Fellowship programs and applicants have had to adjust their procedures and conduct interviews virtually. Despite this we have seen two cycles of outstanding microsurgery fellowship matches and continued interest and growth in both the number of applicants and fellowship programs. Survey results from program directors and applicants have shown that virtual interviews offer sufficient opportunity for applicants and programs to get to know one another and gather enough information for evaluation.

Hospitals have seen ongoing need for microsurgical expertise as trauma and cancer reconstruction cases continue. The pandemic has not dampened graduating resident interest and enthusiasm in pursuing a career in microsurgery. The 2021 match had 28 active fellowship programs, 46 positions offered and a 77% match rate. It proved to be a truly successful match year with some of the best and brightest graduating plastic surgery residents.

In an effort to ensure ongoing success with the microsurgery match, the Microsurgery Fellowship Match Committee reconvened this summer to establish guidelines for the 2022 match. Our committee members: Shai Rozen MD, Jamie Levine MD, Gedge Rosson MD, and Adrian Ooi MD along with ASRM Administrative Liaison Krista Greco; released a statement providing guidance to applicants and fellowship programs. We have resumed the normal timeline with rank lists due on June 1, 2022 and match results available on June 8, 2022.





## Stepping into the Role of Educator

ducation. How do we stay fresh and, key to our profession, innovative? Are acolytes picking up what their teachers are putting down, so to speak? Are we at risk of sounding like Charlie Brown's teacher? The reality is that most people are likely not born educational masters. Nor has there historically been much attention paid to teaching the teacher how to teach in surgical fields. Currently, there are many groups who are studying educational techniques. Our literature and meetings are, through this, enriched, and to those who lead in these areas, we thank you.

For the rest of us average Joes (and Joe-ettes), what do we do to do our best every day on the front lines of education? One potentially "easy" tool to implement is the concept of learning style. If I had a dime for every time I've heard the term "adult learner," I might easily retire to a tropical location. There is a rich and burgeoning body of literature on learning styles. For those who don't have the time to become experts, the simple bottom line that we can weave into our daily lives is this: Different people learn in different ways.

Probably, most of us may not even know how we learn best. Sure, at some point in our past we probably all decided whether we remembered things better if we saw them or heard them, but "learning style" goes very much beyond that. Since so many of us work with large numbers of people who may be learning from us, it probably behooves us to try to deliver information in a variety of ways. Didactics for some. Socratic questioning for others. Stretch challenges for some. Safe environments for others. Most of these concepts boil down to common sense ideas. I'm sure we can all

remember times when we have had to push a tentative learner out of the nest, and other times when we have had to erect fences and add a leash to hold bolder learners back from jumping off precipices before they are ready. The more we get to know those with whom we work, the more organic these processes become. When they don't come naturally, it's nice just to be able to remember that we can use a wide variety of tools to meet our learners where they are.

These thoughts may not shake the world, but hopefully, for the time it takes to read these few paragraphs, this column has provided an opportunity to step outside the routine day-to-day challenge of education for a few minutes, pause, and think, even briefly, about how we do what we do. **RM**
